# A COMPETITOR'S VIEW OF THE INTERNATIONAL 12 REGATTA.

I learnt to sail in a 12' Lugsail dinghy called Mido at Coldham Hall, Surlingham, and spent most of my childhood weekends either sailing her, rowing her, fishing from her or exploring in her. So when Mark Duffield asked whether I would like to sail his International 12 ' lugsail dinghy, Inshallah, in the Regatta at RNSYC, of course I jumped at the chance.

Inshallah was just like Mido, open, clinker built, copper riveted and with a heavy rudder. The only difference was that the boom had jaws and the gaff had to be pulled from one side to the other every time you tacked. I had a quick practice on the Broad the week before and found her quite a handful in a brisk force 3 to 4, especially the timing of the tacking and pulling the gaff round at the same time. Single handed she would be tricky on the sea, but I was confident that with Mark's work colleague and friend Paul, we would be fine.

I thought Inshallah looked like a piece of furniture until I saw the competition. The boats from Holland were immaculate and gleaming in the sun. There were several ladies helming, and most boats were being sailed single handed. However, I knew Inshallah had a good track record, so what could stop us from getting a good result in home waters? I was still confident as I sailed to the start in just 4-5 knots of wind and a strong flooding tide. Others were down tide already. My first start into the tide was the best of the fleet, on the line going well.....but sadly, I peaked too soon. From then on I was overtaken to windward and leeward and on all points of sailing until in each race, I was counting from the back!

Ashore, I made friends with the other Dutch ladies, who were all delightful and I gradually eked out some tips from them. Paul and I got better at roll tacking and keeping the boat moving, we sat right back and our best race on day 2 was a 13<sup>th</sup>, with a feeling that at last we were keeping up with the others.

Day 3 was a good Force 3, Paul had other commitments so I needed a second up. I took a Dutch lady and we made a good team. We were aiming to beat Mark, who on equal points, was just ahead on countback for first local boat! I was up for it and at last feeling enough wind in the sails to remember sailing on Surlingham Broad in Mido. But sadly, the leading Dutch sailors decided to call it a day, worrying about the increasing waves and tide and the possibility of a disaster spoiling the weekend. It was a great weekend, I loved the sailing despite the poor results, I loved the boat and the competition, the sea was at its kindest and we all made lots of friends. I hope that I get another chance to prove my undoubted potential (?)......well, at least I have served two days of what my Dutch friends were calling a two year apprenticeship! I was invited to sail in Holland at Whitsun, so perhaps I will have another go.

# MARINA COMMITTEE

The Troika Gate project was opened on 11<sup>th</sup> June by Mary Anderson, the widow of Dr Ian Anderson, past Admiral and Commodore of the Club, who raced his Dragon Troika at the club. A new lamp at the top of the steps will be installed shortly.

The new pontoons are proving to be a great success and one of the first yachts to moor at the Troika Gate was an Oyster 56!

'Skylark' has required attention recently as one of the VHF radios died, together with its aerial – both suffering from old age. The original anchor winch then came out in sympathy and died just before Sea Week and was replaced – again old age. Then, as disasters go in 3's, the 15 year old race electronic timer failed and has now been replaced.

The new fuel pump and tank are proving worthwhile with fuel being dispensed more quickly and sales are up to 10,000 litres a week.

Tony Knights is keeping the Club informed of the Lowestoft Flood Defence Scheme and has already spent a considerable number of hours meeting with various officials and writing reports. His professional expertise is invaluable to ensure that satisfactory plans are in place for the benefit the Club.
