## JUNIOR NEWS

Member Joe Drake aged 16 has enjoyed another year sailing. He started sailing a Laser with a smaller radial sail but has now moved to a full standard Laser sail.

Joe started the year in February and March with three World and European Qualifiers two in Weymouth and one at Hayling Island Sailing Club, which on the radial ladder left him in 6th place getting him a place in the first round of allocation for the World Championships in Medemblik.

He competed in the Youth Nationals at Hayling Island Sailing Club during the Easter holidays which was a week-long event finishing in 5th place.

In June Joe did his first event in a Standard Laser at a Youth Regatta at Lymington which he finished 1st.

Then in July/August he sailed the Laser Nationals at Abersoch again a week long which he again did in the Standard Laser in which he finished in 3rd place.

In August he represented GB in Medemblik Holland at the Youth World Championships with a radial sail but struggled with the smaller radial sail and light and shifty conditions.

The second Member who has had a very successful year is ten year old Tom Thwaites.

In his first season moving on from Optimist sailing he has sailed in a Topper with a smaller 4.2 rig.

Competing in the 4.2 National series events Tom came first at Grafham, Rutland and Lowestoft. Then he went on to the Nationals held in Pwllheli in Wales where he came 5<sup>th</sup>.

Nearly every competitor in these events was older than Tom making his results even more remarkable.
