## MARINA COMMITTEE

The Marina has generally been well used by visitors this summer but because of bad weather on the Dutch side, this prevented many from enjoying their cruise over to Lowestoft.

Marina Maintenance carries on daily, the work includes scrubbing mess left by the birds to re-fixing and replacing pontoon boards.

A replacement Pontoon has been installed, proving to be more complicated than at first thought.

Large commercial vehicles are unable to enter the Club gate because of its position in relation to the approach road. It was decided to deliver the new 30-foot pontoon to our Boatyard in Norwich and lift it with our crane onto our 'in-house' transport for delivery to School Road Marina. On the same day the old pontoon (which was narrow and had become hazardous) was taken from the Marina to School Road for the new one to be launched and the old one returned to Norwich to be used at Carrow Yacht Club.

When pontoons are launched they will instantly capsize and so had to be cradled between two boats ("Skylark" & "East Point 1"). This operation was very successful but took Stuart, Geoff, Tim Mobbs, David Jobson and myself nearly two days to complete.

We have a spare pontoon float in stock for emergencies. Fuel Sales are good and quite a long way up on previous periods.

The current list of Approved Crane Operators is now attached to the Club Crane.

"Skylark" is operating well and the new Ken Self Chart Plotter is a great asset, especially when placing racing marks.

"East Point 1". Unfortunately one of the two engines is showing signs of age. Stuart has thoroughly investigated and the engine requires about £1,000.00 of parts. In the coming months the Committee will investigate the most cost-effective future of both engines. Thankfully they behaved for Sea Week!

Dredging will be assessed shortly, especially the area between the Tug Arm and the Visitors' Quay. The Port plough dredger attempted to remove spoil from the area recently but, because this spoil is now so hard, an alternative means of removal will have to be considered. Under Club Rules I will have to retire as Marina Committee Chairman at the AGM. I would like to thank my team of Stuart, Tim Mobbs, David Jobson, Chris Merren, Ken Foster and Anthony Knights, to Janet for taking and producing the Minutes and to Simon for all the official paperwork!

The RN&SYC is a Yacht Club with a large membership of Yachtsmen, but is also keen to promote all types of waterborne activity and in recent years has become home to an increasingly active RIB fleet. However, it is also keen to promote other popular pursuits and Skiff/Gig racing/rowing has in recent years gained a great deal of interest and a large following – both as a sport and indeed an enjoyable way of keeping fit.

As part of the 'First Light Festival' a small fleet of gigs rowed into the beach to 'herald' the dawn on the longest day and used the RN&SYC as a base which enabled some of us to get a closer look at a modern boat, and when these photos of a St Ayles skiff were taken.

Gigs are part of our national heritage and played an important part in the maritime history of Norfolk and Suffolk. It is not my intention to relate the history of Gigs here, as Mick Hart, a very old friend who has spent a lifetime in and around boats is giving a talk on the 'History of Gigs' on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> October at the Club – and I hope many of you will attend.

Gigs, were and are, very seaworthy and ideal to be rowed off Lowestoft. The boats, and crews of these boats are often sponsored by companies to gain corporate awareness and promote a fun way of employees to keep fit. However, many boats are 'privately' owned by a group of like-minded individuals who want to row and keep fit at the same time – hence they are often crewed by 'middle aged' folk....Gig rowing and racing is not just the preserve of the younger members!!

## A RN&SYC Member's Summer Cruise 2019

This year three boats from the RN&SYC decided that it would be a good idea to visit France starting with Dunkerque as it is the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Operation Dynamo. The plan then was to go down to Boulogne, Dieppe, Honfleur, across the Channel to the Isle of Wight returning via the South Coast and stopping at various places on the East Coast. However the best laid plans of mice and men, this was not quite meant to be.

Two boats Gentle One and Rovia III waited at the club for the arrival of the third vessel, Yorkshire Belle II who was cruising down from Brundall. The weather was not looking too great but by the time YB II arrived it was beginning to look a little more hopeful. The decision was made to set off on the 12<sup>th</sup> June fairly early and aim to do Lowestoft to Ramsgate in one go, a distance of about 75 nautical miles. Rovia III being the fastest boat set off first. By the time G1 and YB II left it was pouring with rain and poor visibility, fortunately the sea state was fairly calm. Even crossing the Thames estuary was not too bouncy. We arrived at Ramsgate at 14.45 having left at 10.30.

The next two days were beset by strong winds, force 7 and bad seas so we remained on our moorings. Ramsgate is an interesting place with many good restaurants, shopping facilities and transport. By the 15<sup>th</sup> the sea state had calmed down enough for the boats to venture out. We cast off at 08.00 and the crossing could not have been better, calm seas and sunny skies. We arrived at Dunkerque at midday and were safely moored in the YCMN, (YC Mer du Nord) a good marina with all facilities and close to the town. We walked to the beach where Operation Dynamo took place, a beautiful beach. However, there are no dunes there now only a promenade with many high rise buildings and restaurants. There is a very interesting museum called Operation Dynamo which has been established within defences built by Napoleon. It is extremely well done and very sobering. Worth a visit.

After spending a couple of days here we moved on to Boulogne, 43 miles down the coast. Casting off at 8.00 French time we arrived at Boulogne marina at 12.15, by which time the weather was beginning to get hotter. Boulogne has a very interesting entrance in as much there is a large promontory that juts out into the entrance. Attached to this but under water is a wall that cannot be seen even at low water. You keep well to starboard of this and navigate along a wall, find a large white painted circle on the wall and then turn sharply to port and follow the channel into the harbour. It was said that a few had come to grief on this underwater structure.

Boulogne is another very interesting town. A ten minute walk from the marina takes you straight into the shops and the modern part. Another ten minutes up a long hill and you enter the historic part of the town which is closed off to vehicles. It has cobbled streets, many restaurants and a magnificent church. This area is surrounded by a high wall which you can walk along and admire the beautiful views over the town and out to sea.

It was such a lovely place that we decided to stay for five days which meant adjusting our plan. Two boats needed to return by a certain date so the decision was made to return to Ramsgate and then Lowestoft via The Orwell and The Deben. Although the weather was good the sea state was about to change. We cast off at 7.00hrs French time and arrived at Ramsgate at 9.15 BST in time for breakfast. A lovely cruise with smooth seas, wind 2/3, sunny with excellent visibility.

The wind began to pick up and it wasn't until two days later that we were able to leave Ramsgate and head for Shotley as the seas had calmed down again. By now G1 was on her own so once in Shotley we decided to take advantage of the marina's deal of a lift out and summer bottom scrub. Extremely good value and a most efficient service. To be recommended.

The next week was spent visiting Ipswich, Royal Harwich Yacht Club and Woodbridge where it was great to meet up with Bob and Jean Shackleton on Dawn Walk. On the way out of Woodbridge we passed Gwiazda with David and Jad Jobson and Kingsley and Janet Farrington heading for the Tidemill Yacht Harbour just starting their cruise.

A lovely cruise with excellent company. We will look forward to the next one which could be Wells - next-the- Sea in September.
