BOAT PARK AND MARINA

Please help us to help you with some simple guidance for using the boat park and Marina.

If you are planning to bring your boat to the Marina or hardstanding for the first time this year or returning from a trip away, please let Marina Staff know in advance of your arrival. This means they can make sure a berth is available for you and safe for you to use. With social distancing free berths are sometimes used for visitors to help with distancing. On the hardstanding it will make sure you are allocated a suitable space with access to your boat and not compromising the access of others to their berth.

In the same vain please do not park on the hardstanding area north of the slipway. This area is needed to be kept clear so boat owners can access their boats.

If you are planning a trip away on your boat for a period of time; please make sure the Marina Staff know, so they are not worried if you do not return that evening. The Harbour Control also need notifying of your intentions when going to sea with information such as destination or expected return time.

In time, this will become more important, when the EU departure transition ends and Border Force will take more interest in our comings and goings.

RECENT VISITORS TO THE CLUB

ROUND BRITAIN 2020

We had a young visitor at the Club this week his name was Timothy Long. He is on a trip around Britain by sailing boat which may not seem unusual until you know his age. He is just 15.

If he completes his challenge, he will be the youngest person to sail solo around Britain. He started out from Southampton.

The weather tried hard to beat him at Lowestoft with after his arrival there were three days of really strong winds.

However, he set off again on Wednesday afternoon bound for Grimsby

Tim is sailing on "Alchemy" his Hunter Impala 28, covering 43 miles a day, with some longer passages of up to 100 miles. With a total distance of about 1,600 miles the trip is expected to take 6 – 8 weeks possibly longer. Tim has been sailing since the age of 9, but this is by far his biggest challenge yet, as the British coastline presents some formidable hazards, ranging from the busiest shipping lane in the world in the Dover Straits, to the huge tidal ranges of up to 15 metres in the Severn Estuary, not to mention numerous other navigational obstacles all the way round.

Throughout his challenge, Tim will be fundraising for the Ellen MacArthur Cancer Trust, a charity that supports young people aged 8 -24 to rebuild their confidence after cancer through sailing and adventure. A LITTLE BIT OF ONGOING HISTORY

The following article by Paulo Maccione of the Italian Nautical Web Magazine, appeared in my Inbox last week and it has some links to this area. While very much a sales brochure, it has some interesting facts A photograph of Katja from the 1930's is included on Page 204 of the Club's History.



Launched in 1929 from the Brooke shipyard in Lowestoft, after the war she came to the Mediterranean through the French canals. Katja has sailed without interruption ever since, proving herself a wonderful yacht, perfect for family cruising. Recently restored, this fascinating wooden motor yacht (14,70 mt) is looking forward to celebrating her 100th birthday in prime condition, at sea! Currently Katja cruises in the north and central Tyrrhenian Sea.

Katja is a 14.7 metre long motor yacht, designed by H. Parker and built of wood. She was built for Mawdesley Brooke, the owner Brooke shipyard in Lowestoft, was



launched in 1929 and was named after one of his daughters. The yard's roots stretch back to 1874 when Brooke Ironworks, specialized in engines, began activity in Oulton Broad, near Lowestoft. *Katja's* first main engine was a 100 hp, six-cylinder Brooke N° 4059 type 40 F diesel, with a 5 hp Brooke "Dominion" as auxiliary propulsion. In 1931 she was sold to a new owner in Leicester for £ 2,875 and was based for a period in Great Yarmouth.

In recent years *Katja* has undergone several refits with rebuilt decks, electrical systems and engines.
