This discovery is as important as that of the Henry VIII Flagship 'Mary Rose'. The Gloucester was carrying King James II and John Churchill. Had they not survived - and many did not - then the course of history would have been fundamentally altered.

From late October and through to Christmas the Club Calendar is stocked with events to enjoy. The 'iconic' Trafalgar Night, Laying Up dinner, Remembrance Sunday Lunch, the Christmas Fair and the Festive Lunch and Dinner. In addition, the Club will play host to celebrations by a number of our neighbouring and affiliated Clubs and Corporate Members. CRUISING SECTION

The Cruising year began in March with a 'Meet Up' meeting at the Club. The group consisted of like-minded Members who wanted to discuss various ideas for destinations during the year, which we did and the programme for the year was agreed. This was followed by an excellent lunch at the Club.

The first event of the season was the Coronation cruise to Southwold for one night. This was arranged as part of the Coronation weekend and all those who attended were presented with a memento by the Commodore.

Next on the programme was a shake down meal in the Club house, followed by a Cruise and a Meet Up at the Royal Harwich Yacht Club on the River Orwell. We spent 3 nights in their Marina with superb moorings. More meals at the Yacht Club and the Butt and Oyster Pub. Whilst some boats cruised back to Lowestoft one stoic Member and Crew cruised to the Tidal Thames and spent five weeks visiting the Upper Thames.

Next on the agenda in June was an inland cruise on the Broads and a Meet Up at Beccles. We were honoured to be in company with one of our Members who legally flies the White Ensign.

It was decided at the early meeting that there would be a number of summer cruises, one of which was going to be a Meet Up in London at St Katherine's Dock which is adjacent to the Tower of London and is the best hotel in town. In the middle of June, two boats set of from Lowestoft, one from the River Orwell and the boat visiting the Upper Thames all met at St Katherine's. A week had been booked. The Commodore joined us two days before the return cruise. Some of the group paid a visit to the Little Ships Club, with which the RNSYC has a reciprocal arrangement. This Club is well worth a visit. Situated overlooking the Thames and the South bank, it has accommodation and excellent food.

The next port of call on the way home was going to be Ramsgate. Three boats locked out at 11am, two heading for Ramsgate and one for Harwich. Ramsgate Marina is to be recommended. A good location with easy access to the shops, buses and other attractions such as the Tunnels which are interesting and well worth a visit.

It also has the Royal Temple Yacht Club which provides accommodation and light lunches. After two nights it was decided that as the weather was becoming inclement the boats would leave the next morning and head for Lowestoft, leaving the Commodore to stay a night at the Royal Temple to fit in with his plans for the Saturday. The boats cast off at 9am. A little choppy crossing the Thames Estuary, conditions improved the nearer to Lowestoft. By 13.30 the boats were back in the Royal Norfolk and Suffolk Marina after an excellent cruise.

At the beginning of August the Meet Up planned was a visit to Woodbridge.

Three boats set off from the Marina at about midday. A fairly calm cruise down the East coast but the weather decided to change off Sizewell. A very heavy thunderstorm occurred with visibility down to 50 yards although the sea remained flat calm fortunately. Whilst in Woodridge Tide Mill harbour, four other Members of the Club who moor in the Tide Mill harbour joined the group from Lowestoft, so it turned out to be a proper 'Meet'. During the two-day visit there was much socialising and walking the local area. The return cruise to Lowestoft was most enjoyable with good visibility and fairly calm seas.

The last main cruise of the season was a visit to Wells-Next -the- Sea. The skippers and crew of seven boats met for a meal at the Club house before setting off the next day at a respectable hour. Allowing three and a half hours and watching carefully for lobster pots around Cromer, the flotilla arrived at the town quay at 14.45. Most of the cruise was spent carefully watching out as the coast was covered in fog but the sea was like a mill pond. The sun was trying to get its hat on and by the time the Wells leading buoy appeared the sky was blue and the fog had disappeared.



The town has a great deal to offer; lovely shops, plenty of eateries, local transport to Sheringham one way and Holkham and beyond the other way. A lovely walk through the woods and/or on the beach will lead the explorer straight to Holkham Hall. This area is also good for cycling and of course swimming. A newly built RNLI complex stands at the entrance to the harbour. Wells now has a brand-new lifeboat which has been named the Duke of Edinburgh. On her journey to Wells she stayed a couple of nights at the Royal Norfolk and Suffolk, so it was nice to see her in her home port.
